Are We Ready?

It is easy to imagine that prophetic work is the work of individuals - preachers, theologians, educators, politicians, writers, and the like - and perhaps there is some truth in that. In the 21st century, however, I'm convinced that prophetic work is far more likely to be the work of community, and I'd posit that it is



particularly the work of communities of faith, and more specifically for us, the work of the Church.

Walter Bruggeman said, "The prophetic tasks of the church are to tell the truth in a society that lives in illusion, grieve in a society that practices denial, and express hope in a society that lives in despair." This sentence has captured my attention in my search for the role of the Church in this particular time in the life of the citizens of the United States of America.

I've tried to articulate my understanding of the continuing role of First Presbyterian Church of Evansville, Indiana, as a prophetic voice and presence through my preaching and leading in this first year of my work here. I hope my challenge to you has been clear: our commitment to life in this community of faith is one of the most effective acts of resistance that exists. Let's look at Bruggeman's words about the prophetic tasks of the church.

Tell the truth in a society that lives in illusion.

That we are part of a society that lives in illusion seems obvious. One possible reason this congregation has experienced consistent growth this year could be our commitment to telling the truth about what's happening in the world - particularly what's happening in this country - in our worship services (in our prayers, our liturgy, our music, and in the preaching). It seems that many congregations these days are dancing around the truth of this day and time. Some say they are privileging preaching the Truth of Jesus Christ as they avoid talking about anything that could be considered political. Jesus was political. Jesus lived in a time when the empire was threatened by his very presence. A few people have asked me if I'm afraid (or they seem to think I should be afraid) when I preach. I'm not. I haven't always been fearless, and I will avoid being reckless, but I really don't know of any other way to live into this particular calling. In case you haven't been around very long, here's an example of truth vs. illusion:

Truth: "Christian" nationalism is sin. Christianity was never intended to be subservient to one's

citizenship. We can talk about things that are political without becoming partisan in the way

we understand faith.

Illusion: "We are a Christian nation." "The founders of this nation were overtly Christian." "The idea

that there should be a separation of church and state is a misreading of the founding

documents." [To be clear - these statements are false!]

Grieve in a society that practices denial.

If you are awake, you are aware of the deep divisions among the citizens of this country, and you realize that a significant number of our families, co-workers, and neighbors not only practice denial but also live in it. The idea that it is prophetic to grieve may seem counterintuitive. But until we acknowledge what we have lost, what we are losing, what we may lose, we cannot grieve those losses. People who would deny that democracy is in danger can live in an imaginary world that labels the changes that have happened and are happening in our nation as necessary to "save" democracy. People who would privilege single-issue thinking at the city, county, state, or national level can imagine that their "issue" is in and of itself more important than all the accompanying unintended consequences of that tunnel vision. We all may practice some level of denial. But there comes a point where we must identify loss so that we can grieve and eventually heal (not "get over it"!).

Express hope in a society that lives in despair.

Despair hangs heavy in the air this November. Even as courts have ruled that SNAP benefits must continue (using the funds already set aside in case of a government shutdown), this has simply moved us more quickly into urgency about food insecurity. The loss of federal and state resources has meant that the nonprofits that provide food are working hard to meet more needs with less money. As we move toward winter, more and more people will be forced to choose between keeping their electricity on, purchasing medicine, and eating. And still, we talk about hope; not hope the feeling but hope the action.

It may seem ridiculous to talk about a 2.5-million-dollar Campaign for Our Future to fund our ongoing budget of operations and to fund dreams and needs for the Future Hope of this congregation. It is not ridiculous. This congregation has an urgent responsibility to come alongside folks in need in our community and world. This congregation has an amazing opportunity to grow into the future in a way that can ensure its faithful presence, ministry, and mission fifty years from now, one hundred years from now. We are called to do both. In truth, we must do the amazing now so that we can continue to meet urgent needs in the future.

What is urgent may shift - it may expand and contract - but urgent needs will always exist. Every church building or property has value, and it could be argued that the sale of buildings or properties could provide

"x" number of meals, etc. For some congregations, that may be the only way forward. For First Presbyterian Church, however, that would be incredibly short-sighted. And that is why this congregation decided decades ago to stay on the corner of SE Second and Mulberry. We can certainly figure out ways to more effectively use and share our space, and we can continue to grow as a congregation into the future.

So, are we ready?



As a community of faith, we are ready to embrace the prophetic work to which God calls us. In many ways, this has been the role of this congregation throughout its history. One of my favorite new hymn texts is Hope Will Not Fail by David Bjorlin. The text is a powerful reminder that hope, peace, joy, and love will not fail. We'll be learning it in the coming weeks and will use it during Advent. Today, we are learning and becoming the congregation God intends us to be. Today, we continue as a people who are growing in grace, rooted in faith, and reaching for legacy as God leads us toward a future and a hope. And that hope will not fail.



LGBTQ Group Gathering







We've recently introduced a *Campaign for Our Future*. This campaign will span three years of giving. Members and friends of First Presbyterian Church of Evansville, Indiana, are invited to consider a three-year commitment to maintaining and enhancing our ongoing ministries through regular pledged giving to the operating budget, while also planning to support a vision for this congregation's future ministry and mission. We believe we will raise 2.5 million dollars over the next three years.

Our operating budget is currently just under \$450,000 per year. We are hoping that we can receive pledges that total 1.5 million dollars for 2026 through 2028. This will allow us to expand the hours of some of our part-time staff, to expand our ability to do ministry and expand our involvement in mission and justice ministries.

At the core of our request (beyond regular pledged giving to the operating budget) is a gift to the *Campaign for Our Future* for Future Hope: Highest and Best Use. This gift, given with the broadest parameters for use, allows the Session of this congregation to discern the best use of funds that are pledged with the least restrictions, once the monetary goals for each sub-fund are reached.

The **Historic Sanctuary Fund (\$300,000)** sets the stage for the renovation and restoration of our historic sanctuary. This is a long-term project that will require funds beyond the scope of this three-year campaign. Our priorities with the sanctuary renovation and restoration begin with stopping water intrusion and restoring the structural integrity of the towers. While the exterior challenges of the sanctuary are being met, a team (likely several teams) will discern the way forward with enhancements that will make the space more comfortable and flexible for the ways the sanctuary is used for worship and for our community - ways that are consistent with the historic beauty of the building.

After the exterior work is complete, we can turn to the interior of the sanctuary. The repair and restoration of the plaster walls; the cleaning and restoration of the Tiffany window; the replacement of subfloor and flooring; the restoration or replacement of seating (we will most likely restore some of the historic pews, but it is unlikely that all of them can be restored - decisions about seating will require careful consideration, including structural evaluation and bids on restoration); addressing accessibility to the chancel, and the possible placement of a restroom in the narthex, etc.


When we are ready to start work on the interior renovation and restoration of the sanctuary, it will be necessary to have the Fisk organ and console fully wrapped to protect it during the renovation. At the same time, we will have the Steinway grand piano and the 1889 Giesecke organ (made in Evansville and owned by



Evansville AGO) moved to Fellowship Hall, where the service that is normally in the sanctuary will happen during the renovation. We won't be able to estimate how long we will be out of the sanctuary until much closer to the beginning of the interior renovation.

As you can see, the restoration and renovation of the Historic Sanctuary is not a simple task - this fund will get us started on that work.

The **Accessibility and Improvement Fund (\$300,000)** will allow us to make necessary repairs and enhancements to our whole historic facility and to ensure its accessibility to ALL in our community. Desperately needed roof repairs (one temporary repair on the roof of the education wing has been completed, and the contract has been signed and submitted for the replacement of the second-floor



roof). We need an elevator to the second floor to fully use that space. We need to add an exterior ramp on the Chandler Avenue side of the Kerr Chapel so that the education wing can have an accessible entrance separate from the courtyard entrance. We need to add accessible family restrooms in the education wing - a crucial need that will impact the whole church property. Once an accessible entrance by the chapel and accessible family restrooms in the education wing are completed, it will be possible to add doors that will allow us to make the education wing independent of the rest of the building, expanding its use in the evenings. As we do this work, we will rethink the use of all office and classroom spaces converting some single-use spaces to multi-use spaces, rethinking the size and configuration of professional offices, etc.

Unlike the restoration of the sanctuary, most of the projects envisioned for the Accessibility and Improvement Fund can be completed either independently or simultaneously. We could start with the accessible family restroom, for example. Then we could consider installing the accessible entrance by the chapel. The elevator to provide access to the second floor could come after that. There is flexibility in how we approach these necessary projects, which will dramatically improve our ability to serve all people and to better use our space.

Fully funding the **Professional Ministry Fund (\$200,000)** allows us to invest in our people, support our unparalleled music programs, expand our compassionate mission and social justice outreach, and provide thoughtful worship, education, and preaching for our congregation and our community. This

fund will help us expand part-time ministry areas (for example, potentially increasing the hours for the Minister of Spiritual Formation and Connection from 20 hours per week to 30 hours per week (from half-time to three-quarter-time) and potentially adding some part-time administrative positions for ministry with children and youth or a part-time parish visitor or parish associate position. Resources for these areas of ministry are necessary as we anticipate the expansion and development of our staff in ways that support the growth of our congregation.



And for those of you who are so inclined, we hope to discuss legacy giving to our **Endowment Funds** (\$200,000) to ensure that the welcoming place that embraces us now holds that same role decades in the future. This could include planning to endow all or part of your regular pledge so that it continues beyond your life. This could include adding to current endowment funds. This could include creating new endowments (for example, endowing part or all of the Director of Music position). If this interests you, we can connect you with people who can help you plan these gifts.

. . . THIS EFFORT TO SUSTAIN, EXPAND, AND BUILD ON THE LEGACY OF THIS CONGREGATION - WHETHER THROUGH MINISTRY, MISSION, OR CARING FOR OUR PHYSICAL RESOURCES - IS ONE OF THE BIGGEST ACTS OF RESISTANCE TO THE STATE OF THE WORLD AND THE STATUS QUO THAT ANY GROUP OF PEOPLE CAN UNDERTAKE.

As of the writing of this article, we have received a Lead **Gift** of \$100,000 (not a *pledge* - a *gift* that has already been received) for the Future Hope campaign. We have also received an anonymous Leadership Challenge Pledge (from someone outside of the congregation) of \$150,000 for Future Hope: Highest and Best Use. This challenge pledge will match new gifts to Future Hope: Highest and Best Use dollar for dollar. Once new gifts totaling \$150,000 for Highest and Best Use are received, the challenge is met, and we will have a total pledged commitment of \$300,000 (for a total commitment of \$450,000 when added to the Lead Gift that has already been received). I hope our Campaign Co-Chairs will be able to announce that the Leadership Challenge Pledge has been met (and exceeded) by November 16 (the week before everyone will be invited to bring their completed pledges to the *Campaign for the* Future to worship on November 23).

Of course, the giving that is foundational to the *Campaign for Our Future* and makes all of this dreaming for our *Future Hope* possible is your pledged giving to the ongoing operating budget of this congregation. If annual pledging is part of your regular practice of stewardship and generosity, thank you! We hope you will first consider how you will support the operating budget of First Presbyterian Church and *then* consider how you might give toward our *Future Hope*. We know that a three-year commitment to the operating budget may feel like an impossible thing to know, so please remember that a pledge is your best intention for your giving. It can be changed if your circumstances change. It is <u>not</u> a contract or an obligation with legal ramifications. Because we are asking for a three-year commitment rather than a one-year commitment (which is our normal practice), we know that this feels weighty. We trust that God is already at work in and through us and that God will make a way for us to do the things God is calling us toward.

It is entirely possible that, considering the state of the world, you are not all that certain about why we would even consider this BIG DREAM at this time. As your pastor, let me assure you that this effort to sustain, expand, and build on the legacy of this congregation - whether through ministry, mission, or caring for our physical resources - is one of the biggest acts of resistance to the state of the world and the status quo that any group of people can undertake. You may wonder why we would consider raising funds for the operating budget and a building when there are people without affordable housing, people at risk of losing SNAP benefits, and people facing rising costs for health insurance.

The "why" seems clear to me. Even as we are in the midst of incredibly challenging times, we are in a position to do the work to solidify the role of a *people* and a *place* for the future. Securing a stable way of doing ministry here so that you can be nurtured and challenged and sent out into the community to do the work of the church there. You are the people. This is the place. We have the privilege of gathering in this place so that God can use this time to sharpen us for whatever lies ahead.
